# CRTPA TRANSPORTATION ALTERNATIVES PROGRAM (TAP) Program Overview

- The CRTPA Transportation Alternatives Program coordinates region's solicitation and ranking of applications seeking federal Transportation Alternatives Set-Aside funding (prior to provision to FDOT)
- Program funded with a set-aside of funds under the Surface
   Transportation Block Grant Program as identified in the Fixing America's
   Surface Transportation (FAST) Act under 23 U.S.C. 133(h).
- Projects are solicited every 2 years (why not annually...)
- Approximately \$310,00 is dedicated to the CRTPA area annually in TA funding

#### **Project Eligibility**

- 1. Construction, planning, and design of on and off-road trail facilities for <u>pedestrians</u>, <u>bicyclists</u>, and other non-motorized forms of transportation (pedestrian and bicycle facilities)
- 2. Construction, planning, and design of infrastructure-related projects/systems to provide <u>safe routes for non-drivers</u>, including children, older adults, and individuals with disabilities (safe routes to non-drivers)
- 3. Conversion and use of abandoned railroad corridors for non-motorized use
- 4. Construction of turnouts, overlooks, and viewing areas
- 5. Inventory, control, or removal of outdoor advertising
- 6. Historic preservation and rehabilitation of historic transportation facilities
- 7. Vegetation management practices in transportation rights-of-way
- 8. Archaeological activities related to impacts from transportation projects
- 9. Environmental mitigation activities





### **Eligible Sponsors**


- local governments
- regional transportation authorities
- transit agencies
- natural resource or public land agencies
- school districts, local education agencies, or schools
- tribal governments
- any other local or regional governmental entity with responsibility for or oversight of transportation or recreational trails (other than a MPO or a State agency) that the State determines to be eligible



#### **TAP Process**

- Submit an application (www.crtpa.org). Required items include (IMPORTANT):
  - a resolution of support from the project sponsor
  - proof of right-of-way ownership of proposed project (only applications that identify that the proposed project is located within public ownership will be considered). Such proof includes the provision of

Florida Department of Transportation, CDC, and FAST Act policies supporting alternative means of WI IEREAS. the proposed sidewalk on Mia Street, Mollie Avenue, and Millie Street will provide the eighborhoods on the north side of SR 710 (Commerce Avenue) a safe means of pedestrian access to Shelby Elementary School, Lexie Sports Park, shopping center, church, and busing NOW, THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED BY THE City Commission, City of Ryan, FL THAT: The City Commission supports the construction of the Millie Mollie Mila Sidewalk Project and authorizes the City to submit an application to the Florida Department of Transportation in 2017 to be considered for Transportation Alternatives (TA) Set-Aside Surface Transportation Block Grant (STBG) Program funding; and Expresses a willingness to enter into a Memorandum of Agreement between the <u>City of Ryan</u>. 

#### **EXAMPLES OF UNDESIRABLE APPLICATIONS**

- Includes Ineligible Activity
- R/W Issues Not Addressed
- Environmental Issues (protected lands, historic area, etc.)
- Permits Needed, but no evidence of coordination included
- Project Does Not Address a Non-Motorized Need
- Project Mostly Benefits an Isolated Group
- No Documentation of Public or Private Support
- No Documentation of Local Planning Consistency
- Ownership Issues

- December 19, 2019 TA Informational Meeting (Tallahassee City Hall)
- January 21, 2020 CRTPA adopts TA evaluation criteria
- March 6, 2020 TA applications **DUE**
- March 2020 TA applicant interviews with TA Subcommittee
- March 2020 TA Subcommittee application ranking meeting
- April 2020 CRTPA adopts FY 2022 FY 2026 TA Priority Project List
- <u>April 2020</u> CRTPA transmits PPL to FDOT for use in development of the FY 2022 FY 2026 Work Program





### **Previously Funded Projects**

Blountstown Street Sidewalk Improvements (City of Tallahassee) (Limits: US 90 to Tharpe Street); project cost \$1.3 m; ultimately received \$335,000 TA funds in FY 21 (Leon County)

TALU \$335,000 LF \$502,500 SU \$450,000 \$ 1,287,500

Adams Street (CR 268) (City of Quincy) Sidewalk Construction (Limits: Clarke Street to MLK Jr Blvd); construction funded in FY 18 (Gadsden County)

 Glenview Drive Sidewalk Project (Limits: Thomasville Road to Meridian Road); construction funded in FY 21 (Leon County)

- Mamie Scott Drive (Limits: Mississippi St to Texas Hill Rd); construction funded in FY 16 (Jefferson County)
- <u>Capital Cascades Bridge</u> received \$850,000 in FY 14 (Leon County)
